


Long Reach High School

Parking & Entrance Map







Assessment AS Learning; A Student-accountable Approach

Description: In an ideal world, arts educators would not be asked to assign letter or numeric grades to their students' creative work. Unfortunately, grading is a required part of most classroom music experiences from elementary to college. In this session, educators will experience the guided rubric-making process through collaborative music-making and brainstorm opportunities for assessment AS learning in their own classrooms. While still an imperfect solution, student-accountable assessment is a step towards more equitable grading practices.



Lucia Schaefer (they/she) has over 10 years experience teaching students from PreK to 8th grade. Lucia holds a Masters Degree in Choral Music Education and is certified in the Kodály method, Orff process, and Arts Integration. They frequently present locally, regionally, and nationally on the topic of arts integration to both music and general education teachers alike. Lucia is committed to teaching music through a globally-centered and decolonized lens and centers her students' experiences.

This session will include a brief refresher course on conducting fundamentals, tips for training your ensemble to respond immediately to your gesture, and a few reminders for running an efficient rehearsal where music-making time is maximized.



David Mann is a DMA Choral Conducting student at the University of Maryland. He is also the artistic director of Voce Chamber Singers, a 30-voice auditioned community ensemble in Vienna, Virginia. Prior to attending UMD, David was a high school choral director for 7 years in Prince William County. He earned a Masters in Choral Conducting from Michigan State University where he was recognized as winner of the American Prize in Choral Conducting in 2018.

Instructional Design Fundamentals for Music Educators

Description: Instructional design is the process of crafting efficacious learning experiences. It combines educational science and program development principles to target skill and knowledge acquisition and application. This session explores the common methods used in instructional design, like the ADDIE model, cognitive rigor and load, and learning patterns, and how they can apply to music curriculum. Participants will have the opportunity to draft their own learning pattern and engage in the instructional design process.



Evan Combs has spent his career developing innovative educational opportunities for learners across all ages and demographics, focusing on authentic experiences that leverage technology, adaptive learning, and educational science. He has worked with The Juilliard School, Pearson, Maryland schools and colleges, and national non-profits developing curriculum that has reached over 100,000 learners. In addition to instructional design, he is a published composer with works for various ensembles available through Grand Mesa Marching and TUX People's Music.




